The Concept

Islamabad Conclave-2024

Thematic Focus: "Pakistan and the Evolving Global Order"

Historically, the global order has been characterized by multiple power centers, bipolarity, and even unipolarity at times. However, recent decades have seen the emergence of new major powers, especially China, signaling a structural shift. This is propelling the international order towards multipolarity, influenced by several factors, which include China's growing economic, military, and technological strength; Russia's resurgence; quest for 'strategic autonomy' by some in Europe; and consequential developments in the Middle East and Asia-Pacific. The emergence of a newer order – though still nascent – is changing the global political, economic, and strategic landscape. It entails significant challenges and opportunities, as major powers seek to fortify their political, economic, and military strengths as well as enhance their influence across various regions and the globe. A complex interplay of competition and cooperation is underway. China is assiduously pursuing economic connectivity initiatives like Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), and becoming increasingly global in its outreach with Global Development Initiative (GDI), Global Security Initiative (GSI), and Global Cultural Initiative (GCI). The U.S. is trying to maintain its dominance through military power and technological superiority, and by revitalizing old security alliances and stitching up new ones. Russia is reasserting its global role through political, economic, and military means and would be a pivotal factor in any new security architecture in Europe, post-Ukraine.

The major power competition is being witnessed in almost all domains – especially political, economic, technological, military, and information. Military alliances are increasingly shifting toward warfighting doctrines and postures, which could undermine international peace and security as well as regional strategic stability. There has been a sharp increase in nuclear rhetoric and the development of new nuclear weapons, while the established arms control and disarmament regimes continue to face serious erosion. A transformation in established global norms is also discernible while multilateral institutions are coming under increasing stress. Multilateral institutions have been fundamental in helping to maintain global peace and

security, promote economic development, and foster cooperation on critical issues such as health, food security, and climate change. Organizations like the United Nations (UN), World Trade Organization (WTO), International Monetary Fund (IMF), and the World Bank were established to promote international cooperation and address shared global challenges. However, the rise of new powers, growing economic disparities, and urgent and mounting non-traditional threats and challenges including climate change and pandemics have prompted many to question the relevance and efficacy of multilateral institutions. A drift towards 'minilateralism' – small, issue-based groupings – is palpable.

As the global order undergoes changes, the role of 'Middle Powers' and 'Global South' is coming under sharper focus as well. Both sets of nations are finding increasing space to maneuver – with 'Middle Powers' seeking to prudently navigate the major power competition and collaborate on issues of their common concern. The 'Global South' wants to foster South-South cooperation, exchange ideas and solutions, multiply their efforts and resources, and raise a united voice for a multipolar global order.

The major power competition is also impacting regional security dynamics and architecture. Ongoing conflicts and regional tensions are paving the way for more conflicts and accentuating regional instability. The strategic landscape in the Middle East, South Asia, and Asia-Pacific is being altered in fundamental ways.

For Pakistan, the evolving global order presents both challenges and opportunities. As an established middle power, Pakistan has to prudently chart its course in the emerging order. The country finds itself at a crossroads, seeking to balance its security imperatives with its core economic interests. The situation becomes even more complex as Pakistan is expected not only to manage its relations with the competing major powers, i.e. China and the U.S., but also to ensure a balance of power in South Asia at a time when India has been leveraging the global turmoil to win unabated support from the U.S., in maximizing its strategic power. Pakistan's stance on the Palestinian question and other developments in the Middle East underscores its unwavering commitment to upholding international law. As regional powers recalibrate their relations in response to these developments, Pakistan must reassess its diplomatic posture and outreach to safeguard its core security and economic interests and engage

with all major powers to ensure regional peace and stability. At the same time, Pakistan must work to accentuate its pivot to geo-economics.

With the foregoing in view, the Institute of Strategic Studies Islamabad (ISSI) is hosting the 4th Edition of its flagship dialogue forum, the Islamabad Conclave, on the theme of "Pakistan and the Evolving Global Order" on December 3-4, 2024. The Islamabad Conclave is a Track 1.5 initiative that seeks to bring together the high echelons of foreign and Pakistan leadership, policymakers, and members of the academia and research community at a single platform to find innovative solutions to complex political, security, and economic issues, and non-traditional threats, affecting Pakistan, the region, and the globe. The format of the Islamabad Conclave is a high-level interaction among members of the government, academia, and public and private sectors in Plenary and Working Sessions. After the Inaugural Plenary, this year's Islamabad Conclave is divided into five Working Sessions, followed by a Concluding Plenary. The Working Sessions will cover the following themes:

- i. "Major Power Competition: Emerging Realities" (CPSC)
- ii. "Evolving Strategic Environment: Impact on Order, Institutions, and Norms" (ACDC)
- iii. "Space for Middle Powers 'Global South'" (ISC)
- iv. "Transforming Regional Dynamics and Architecture: Pakistan's Posture" (CAMEA)
- v. "Future of Multilateralism" (CSP)







Working Session-I

Session Theme: "Major Power Competition: Emerging Realities"



Ambassador Tehmina Janjua, a career diplomat who joined the Foreign Service of Pakistan in 1984, served as Pakistan's Foreign Secretary. She has held key diplomatic positions, including Permanent Representative to the United Nations and other international organizations in Geneva (2015-2017), Ambassador to Italy (2011-2015),

and Deputy Permanent Representative to the UN in Geneva (2005-2009). Domestically, she has held senior roles at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, including Director General of Strategic Planning and Spokesperson. Ms. Janjua holds a Master's in International Affairs from Columbia University and a degree in Literature from Quaid-e-Azam University, Islamabad.



Dr. Hu Shisheng is a Senior Research Fellow and the Director of the Institute for South Asian Studies at the China Institutes of Contemporary International Relations (CICIR). Hu received his BA in Hindi and his MA in Sanskrit and Bali languages from Peking University. Hu did his PhD in International Politics & Relations with a

focus in Ethnic and Religious issues from CICIR in 2006. Hu's research areas include: the political and security situations in India and Pakistan, ethnic and religious problems in South Asia and the Tibet issue. His most recent research focuses on South Asia—particularly India, Pakistan and Afghanistan security issues.



Dr. Farhan Hanif Siddiqi is a Professor in the School of Politics and International Relations. He holds a PhD from the University of Karachi (2010), where his research focused on ethnic politics in post-1971 Pakistan, particularly the Baloch, Sindhi, and Mohajir movements. He also holds a Master's in International Relations from

the University of Karachi (1995) and the London School of Economics (1999). He has served as a consultant for various international projects, including those with the Korea Institute for International Economic Policy and the Middle East Research Institute.



Dr. Andreea Stoian Karadeli is an Assistant Professor at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley (UTRGV), U.S. in the School of Interdisciplinary Programs and Community Engagement, where she has been teaching since 2021. She holds a PhD in Intelligence and National Security from Academia Nationala de Informatii "Mihai

Viteazul" (2019) and an MA in Security, Conflict, and Justice Studies from the University of Exeter (2014). Dr. Stoian Karadeli's research interests focus on major power politics, intelligence, security, and conflict, with a particular emphasis on European intelligence cultures, cognitive warfare, and terrorism. In addition to her academic career, Dr. Stoian Karadeli has extensive professional experience, including work as an independent researcher, mediator, and interpreter.



Mr. Salman Zaidi works as Director Programs at Jinnah Institute. He was part of the Institute's founding team in 2010 and leads on multiple thematic areas, particularly Track 2 diplomacy projects, democratic governance, and climate change. Zaidi also consults with international development agencies on improving federal and provincial

policy frameworks for security, technology, economic growth, and climate change. He is currently a member of the PM's Advisory Council on Climate Change and has previously been a member of the National Security Advisory Group on Gender. He has authored and edited multiple publications, and holds an MSc in Violence, Conflict and Development from SOAS, UK.

Working Session-II

Session Theme: "Evolving Strategic Environment: Impact on Order, Institutions and Norms"



General Zubair Mahmood Hayat, NI(M) HI(M) (Retd.), joined the Pakistan Army in 1976 and had a distinguished military career spanning over four decades. A graduate of Fort Sill, Oklahoma (USA), the Command and Staff College, Camberley (UK), and the National Defence University, Islamabad, he holds two master's

degrees in War Studies and Military Science. General Hayat has been awarded several prestigious Honors, including the Humanities Gold Medal, Master Gunner Award, and Master War Fighter Award. Throughout his career, General Hayat held key command and staff positions, including commanding an Infantry Division and Corps. He served as Army & Air Adviser to the United Kingdom, Chief of Staff of a Strike Corps, and Director General of Strategic Plans Division, overseeing Pakistan's nuclear program. His final appointment was as the 16th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Committee, a position he held from 2016 to 2019, before retiring after 43 years of service. He is the recipient of several distinguished medals, including Nishan-i-Imtiaz (Military) and Hilal-i-Imtiaz (Military), as well as international Honors such as "The Legion of Merit" (Turkey) and "King Abdul Aziz Medal of Excellence" (Saudi Arabia). Since retiring, he continues to lecture on geo-strategy, national security, defence, and leadership.



Ambassador Zamir Akram is a distinguished diplomat and expert in international relations, currently serving as an Advisor to the Strategic Plans Division of the Government of Pakistan. From 2008 to 2015, he served as Pakistan's Ambassador and Permanent Representative to the United Nations and other International Organizations in Geneva,

where he was instrumental in advancing issues of disarmament, human rights, and humanitarian affairs. In 2015, he was elected as Chair-Rapporteur of the Human Rights Council's Working Group on the Right to Development and was later awarded the Star of Merit by the State of Palestine for his contributions to Palestinian solidarity. Ambassador Akram's earlier career included serving as Additional Foreign Secretary, where he oversaw Pakistan's foreign and security policies. He has held diplomatic assignments in the Soviet Union, India, the United States, and the United Nations. Ambassador Akram holds a master's degree in International Relations from the London School of Economics and has authored "The Security Imperative – Pakistan's Nuclear Deterrence and Diplomacy."



Professor Andrey Pavlov is a distinguished academic and expert in strategic studies, holding a PhD in history from Saint-Petersburg University. He is currently a professor at Saint-Petersburg State University and serves as the Chair of the master's program in "Strategic and Arms Control Studies" at the School of International Relations. In his

role, he teaches courses on the history of strategy, nuclear strategy, and arms control. His research and publications cover a wide range of topics related to Russian national security, strategic stability, and arms control. Pavlov is also the co-editor of the book "Nuclear Russia: International and Domestic Agendas" (2020), contributing to the ongoing discourse on Russia's nuclear policies and their global implications. His work is a valuable resource for understanding the complexities of modern strategic dynamics, with a particular focus on Russia's role in the evolving global security landscape.



Dr. Moonis Ahmar is a distinguished academic with over 36 years of experience in teaching, research, and project management, specializing in International Relations, conflict, and security studies. He is a Meritorious Professor of International Relations at the University of Karachi and has served as Chairman of the Department of

International Relations and Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences. Dr. Ahmar has taught and conducted research at various prestigious national and international institutions, including the University of Illinois, London School of Economics, and Nanyang Technological University. His expertise spans South and Central Asia, with significant contributions to terrorism, conflict, and security studies. He has published extensively in renowned international journals and authored several books, including Conflict Management and Vision for a Secular Pakistan. Dr. Ahmar has received numerous awards for his teaching and research, including the Best Teacher Award from the Higher Education Commission of Pakistan. His career reflects a commitment to advancing academic excellence and peace studies.



Ambassador Tahir Hussain Andarabi is the Director General of the Arms Control & Disarmament (ACDIS) Division in Pakistan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. With a distinguished career in diplomacy, he previously served as Pakistan's Ambassador to the Republic of Tunisia, concurrently accredited to the Republic of Malta, from

2021 to 2023. Prior to that, he held the position of Ambassador/Deputy Permanent Representative of Pakistan to the United Nations and other International Organizations in Geneva, Switzerland, from 2017 to 2021. Ambassador Hussain has had significant postings abroad, including the Embassy of Pakistan in Beijing, China, where he served as Second Secretary (2001-05) and Counsellor (2013-15). He also worked at Pakistan's Permanent Mission to the United Nations in New York as Counsellor (2009-13). Within the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, he has held various key roles, including Deputy Director and Director in the Foreign Secretary's Office, Director for India (2015), and Director in the Foreign Minister's Office (2015-17). He also served as Desk Officer/Deputy Director managing Africa, India, and Kashmir Affairs from 1999 to 2006. Ambassador Hussain holds a degree from King Edward Medical University, Lahore, a Fellowship from the Institute for the Study of Diplomacy at Georgetown University, and a Graduate Certification in Chinese Language from Beijing Language and Culture University.

Working Session-III

Session Theme: "Space for Middle Powers & 'Global South'"



Dr. Moeed W. Yusuf, Vice Chancellor of Beaconhouse National University, Pakistan's first not-for-profit liberal arts institution, is a distinguished academic and public intellectual. Previously, he served as Pakistan's youngest National Security Adviser (NSA), advising the Prime Minister on national security and leading the formulation

of Pakistan's first-ever National Security Policy. Yusuf's extensive background in policy research includes his role as associate vice president at the U.S. Institute of Peace, and faculty positions at Boston University and George Washington University in the U.S., as well as Lahore University of Management Sciences and Quaid-e-Azam University in Pakistan. He has

consulted for organizations like the UN, World Bank, and Asian Development Bank and has authored several influential books, including Brokering Peace in Nuclear Environments. Known for his expertise in South Asian security, Dr. Yusuf is a prominent media contributor on topics of national security, foreign policy, and crisis management.



Prof. Dr. Arshi Saleem Hashmi is Dean, Faculty of Contemporary Studies at National Defence University Islamabad. She is a specialist in religious conflicts, counter-violent extremism, and conflict resolution in South Asia. She has held prestigious fellowships, including the Oxford School of Global and Area Studies, Yale World

Fellow, Harvard's Kennedy School, and Rotary International Peace Fellowship. Dr. Arshi is a member of Women without Borders and its "Sisters Against Violent Extremism" project and has spoken at platforms like TEDxWomen. She has collaborated with USIP, Pew Forum, and the Middle East Institute, and frequently appears as a political analyst on media. Additionally, she lectures at military institutions and serves on Pakistan's National Counter Terrorism Authority's Committee of Experts. She holds degrees in International Peace and Conflict Studies from American University, Johns Hopkins, and Quaid-e-Azam University.



Dr. Haibin Niu is a Senior Fellow, Director of Institute for Foreign Policy Studies, Shanghai Institutes for International Studies (SIIS). Dr. Niu joined SIIS after receiving his PhD of International Relations at Fudan University in 2006. He is also Deputy Secretary-general of

Chinese Association for Latin American Studies. Dr. Niu used to be a visiting scholar at various universities and think tanks in the U.S. Germany, Brazil, South Africa, and Peru.



Dr. Ali Awadh Asseri served as Ambassador of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia in Pakistan (2001-09) and Lebanon (2009-16) and is a board member at Rasanah — the International Institute for Iranian Studies in Riyadh. He holds a PhD in economics from Beirut Arab University.



Ambassador Dr. Major General Raza Muhammad (Retd.) has held significant command and staff roles in the Pakistan Army and served as Additional Secretary in the Ministry of Defence Production. Post-retirement, he was appointed Ambassador of Pakistan to Mauritius,

Madagascar, Seychelles, and Comoros. He has also been Executive Director Services at the Army Welfare Trust, Advisor to the President of National Defence University (NDU), and is currently the President of the Islamabad Policy Research Institute (IPRI). With service in Saudi Arabia and training in Germany and the U.S., he has taught at premier institutions like the Pakistan Military Academy and NDU. Since 2018, he has been on the Faculty of Contemporary Studies at NDU, regularly speaking on CPEC, Kashmir, and regional security. Dr. Raza holds an MPhil on post-2014 Afghanistan and a PhD on CPEC's impact on Pakistan and Afghanistan's societal emancipation.

Ms. Hina Rabbani Khar is currently the Chairperson of the Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs of the National Assembly of Pakistan. Ms. Khar entered politics in 2002 as an MNA and was appointed as Parliamentary Secretary for Economic Affairs and the Minister of State for Economic Affairs. In 2008 she was elected once again as MNA and

in this term she went on to become the first ever woman to be sworn in as Foreign Minister of Pakistan. Since then, she has been representing Pakistan on the world stage in forums like Munich Security Conference, Paris Peace Forum, Davos, and many other regional and international events. Having served as Minister of State for Foreign Affairs recently, Ms. Khar has been elected as chairperson of Foreign Relations Committee, and is currently serving in this role.



Ambassador Asif Durrani is an accomplished Pakistani diplomat with a distinguished career spanning over 32 years in the Foreign Service. Most recently, he served as Pakistan's Special Representative on Afghanistan, demonstrating his expertise in regional affairs. His prominent assignments include serving as Deputy Chief of

Mission in Kabul and as Pakistan's Ambassador to Iran and the United Arab Emirates. Additionally, he has also held important positions in places like New Delhi, New York, Kabul, and London. Early in his career, he also served at the United Nations in New York as well. Ambassador Durrani's extensive experience has established him as a respected authority in diplomacy and foreign policy.



Mr. Kawa Hassan is a Non-resident Fellow with Stimson's Middle East program. He is also a consultant on Middle East affairs, and an Iraq expert with the NATO Communications and Information Agency. He previously served as Executive Director of Stimson Europe, Director of the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) Program &

Senior Fellow, Vice President of the MENA Program. He has also served as a Director EU Office, East West Institute (EWI) where he led Track 2 diplomacy, policy research, and advocacy initiatives on mediation and conflict resolution. Kawa Hassan is the author and editor of numerous publications, an international speaker, and he regularly provides interviews to global media outlets on MENA affairs. He holds a Master of Science in International Relations, Political Science from the University of Amsterdam, and studied English and German at the Al-Mustansiriya University, Baghdad, Iraq.



Mr. Leo Wigger is an editor for Zenith, a Berlin-based foreign policy magazine, where he is focusing on international geopolitics. A political scientist by training, Leo holds an MSc in State, Society and Development from SOAS, University of London and previously received a BA in European Studies from Bremen University. He is an

Associate Partner and leads the South Asia and Eurasia programs at the foreign policy think-and-do-tank Candid Foundation, based in Berlin,

Germany. The Candid Foundation is working in the fields of media training, conflict mediation and digital development in international cooperation. In 2022, Leo published his critically acclaimed first book. In the same year, he also became a columnist at the German daily Der Tagesspiegel. His work has appeared in German and international media such as die ZEIT, Welt, Okaz, the Diplomat, Süddeutsche, or Deutschlandfunk.



Mr. Haroon Sharif is a globally renowned expert in international development, economic diplomacy, regional cooperation, and development financing. Founder and Senior Fellow of the Sustainable Development Impact Forum, he facilitates strategic partnerships for regional connectivity. He has also served as Pakistan's Minister of

State and Chairman of the Board of Investment. He has a Postgraduate degree in International Business and Development Economics from the London School of Economics and the University of Hawaii.



Mr. Michael Kugelman is the Director of the South Asia Institute at the Wilson Center in Washington, D.C. He is also a columnist for Foreign Policy magazine and writes its South Asia Brief, a weekly newsletter of news and analysis from the region. He has managed the South Asia portfolio at the Wilson Center since 2007, and he leads the Center's

programming and research on the region. His recent projects focus on shifting geopolitics in South Asia, U.S.-India security relations, the future of U.S.-Pakistan relations, and the role of strategy during the U.S.-led war in Afghanistan.

Working Session-V

Session Theme: "Future of Multilateralism"



Ambassador Inam-ul-Haque is a distinguished Pakistani diplomat with a career spanning several decades. Born on November 10, 1940, he joined the Foreign Service of Pakistan in 1965. Throughout his career, he held pivotal roles, including serving as Pakistan's Ambassador to Turkey and China, and as Permanent Representative to the

United Nations. In February 2000, he was appointed as the Foreign Secretary of Pakistan, the highest position in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He also served as Minister of State for Foreign Affairs from June to November 2002. Notably, he was the Foreign Minister of Pakistan in the caretaker government from November 2007 to March 2008. Ambassador Inam-ul-Haque's extensive experience and leadership have significantly contributed to shaping Pakistan's foreign policy and diplomatic engagements on the global stage.



Ambassador Li Junhua was appointed as the Under-Secretary-General for Economic and Social Affairs by UNSG António Guterres on 25 July 2022. Prior to his appointment, Mr. Li was Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of China to Italy and San Marino. He brings to the position perspectives and visions on fostering

multilateral economic and social cooperation, with a commitment to engage with all parties to further implement the 2030 Agenda including dedication to serve Member States. He has contributed to numerous meetings of the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP), the United Nations General Assembly and Security Council, as well as other multilateral meetings including the G20, Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC), Asia-Europe Meeting (ASEM), BRICS etc.



Dr. Ashfaque Hasan Khan is the Director General of the NUST Institute of Policy Studies (NIPS) in Islamabad and has served as the Principal & Dean of both the NUST Business School and the School of Social Sciences and Humanities for over 15 years. With a PhD in Economics from Johns Hopkins University, he has held significant

roles, including Special Secretary Finance and Director General of the Debt Office at Pakistan's Ministry of Finance (1998-2009). Dr. Khan has served on advisory boards like the Asian Development Bank Institute and currently sits on the Academic Committee of the International Finance Forum, Beijing. A distinguished scholar with over 185 publications, he has authored books on global economic challenges. His contributions to economics and public policy earned him Pakistan's Sitara-i-Imtiaz (2005) and the ECO

Excellence Award (2010). Dr. Khan frequently lectures at premier national institutions, sharing his expertise in economic science and policy.




Dr. Salma Malik is an Associate Professor and HEC Approved Supervisor in the Department of Defense and Strategic Studies at Quaid-i-Azam University, Islamabad. Notably, he represented Pakistan at the UN Permanent Mission, negotiating key Security Council and General Assembly resolutions. An alumnus of Harvard Law School (LL.M., 1998) and Khyber Law College (LL.B., 1993), he also holds a postgraduate diploma in International Law from The Hague. A published scholar, Ambassador Shah has co-authored works on UN legislative powers. He is married with three children.

Working Session-IV


Session Theme: "Transforming Regional Dynamics and Architecture: Pakistan's Posture"


